30 Years of working for the Poor in Malawi

It is now 30 years since the charity of Seedsowers Trust, formally known as Malawi Mission visited Malawi for the first time in Easter 1994. This was prompted by a letter received from a rural pastor from the village of Mitabali near the city of Blantyre. What the founder saw on that visit was the desperate need for clean water. The women in this village had to trudge miles to obtain a bucket of very dubious water. After much fundraising and miracles a team of 10 people went to Malawi in 1995 and drilled and installed the first borehole in Matabali , the Afridev pump being supplied by Action Aid. The project was handed over to Charles Banda who assisted us in the early years of the project. Charles and his group went onto sink more than 1000 boreholes and ended up presenting a paper on water and sanitation at the UN in New York. Sadly, Charles died of Cancer in 2012. Seedsowers has continued its work in Malawi through its Malawian Trus-



tees, building clinics, water provision, education, agriculture, and disaster relief.

On the Chairman's visit to Malawi in 2022 he was taken to Fikani Village to see the conditions with which the Health Visitors have to operate when dealing with the under fives children's clinic. The only shelter they had from the weather was a flimsy grass shelter and in the rainy season it was impossible to hold any under fives sessions and hence these clinics did not happen. During Cyclone Freddy even this facility was washed away.

With generous support of Medical Mission News, a medical charity founded by the medical profession in the UK, a complete purpose built clinic building has been built at Fikani Village. This clinic building will not only serve Fikani but

A Girls Changing Room provided at Chinamvuu Primary School

Chinamvuu Primary School is a Local Education Authority primary school located in Kavallo Village in Lirangwe Blantyre rural. The school is a complete primary school offering lessons from standard 1-8 and has 1228 students of which 668 are girls and most of the girls are of adolescent age.

The sanitary areas for these girls did not meet the acceptable standards of a girl friendly sanitary area and this discouraged the girls attending schools during their menstruation periods, thus losing sessions of their education.

Prior to the building of the Changing Rooms at the school the only place they could use as a changing room was the head teacher's house which is near the school. This was an inconvenience to the privacy of the head teacher's home, also the students themselves did

not feel comfortable about the situation and hence they tended to absence themselves from school for the whole of their menstruation cycle.

Seedsowers Trust funded this building with the small donations provided by our regular monthly givers.

A Seedsowers team headed by our trustee in Malawi, Agnes Mkoko, trained the mother groups on how to make reusable sanitary pads for distribution to the adolescent girls.

The community itself provided the bricks, sand, aggregate and labour needed. Seedsowers provided the expensive materials such as cement, iron sheets, timber, doors etc.

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A New Classroom Block for Nankuyu School

The Nankuyu Full Primary School was established in 1994 and has two classroom blocks. The school has classes from 1 to 8 and the available blocks cater for four classes only, the rest learn under a makeshift class under a tree.

The school is located in Blantyre rural, Chigonawaya Village, Traditional Authority Kuntaja. The school has an enrolment of 326 boys and 341 girls making a total of 667 pupils. The school has no classrooms for Standard 1 and 2. These two classes learn outside under a tree. There are no classes for these classes during the rainy season or when there are high temperatures.

The community itself tried to build a classroom block itself but this was condemned as unsafe by the Ministry of Education after it was built hence the classes had to resume outside again.

Through the generous support of Christian Africa Relief Trust (CART) a new school block is now in the process of being built.

You will note that the pupils are sitting on rocks with their exercise books resting on their knees. We are hoping to raise funds to purchase a number of double desks to equip the new classroom at a cost of $\pounds 65.00$ each. 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Update on the New Clinic at Makwete

The initial plans to locate the Under Fives Clinic at Makwete were revised following consultations with the representative of the Ministry of Health, which advised relocating the project to the more central location of the village of Kambali. This would enable the clinic to serve the villages of Makwete, Kambali, Magagada and Muluntha. The new location enable the clinic to serve a population of approximately 2500 people including 364 children under the age of five.

The clinic will offer many essential serves such as, Immunization, Health Education, Nutrition Assessment, Family Planning and other vital health services.

As can be seen from the photos the project is well under way and it is anticipated to be completed in six months. The local community are very active in the project providing the labour, bricks, sand and aggregate needed and has fostered a sense of ownership and hence responsibility amongst the community members.

This project has been enabled by the generous sponsorship of Medical Mission News who also sponsored the Fikani Clinic.

We also thank the local churches and their pastors in helping us initiate the project.

Rhuo Gravity Fed Water Pipe System Rehabilitation

The Rhuo Gravity Fed Water system pipes water from the Rhuo River to villages in TA Mabuka, Mulanje providing them with clean fresh water. It serves 1000 households who maintain the system through community contributions with support from the Water User Association.

The whole system was severely damaged due to the recent cyclones and storms and the substandard pipes broken and washed away cutting off the supply of water to the above communities. Seedsowers Trust with the charity Christian African Relief (CART) as sponsor, replaced the broken and the sub-standard pipes with community support and revamped the system to make it more sustainable in the future.

The local communities have been encouraged and empowered to manage and maintain the water system through training and capacity building thus achieving improved community engagement and ownership.

The project has trained 20 community members on water system maintenance and repair and a functional Water User Association established to oversee the system management of the maintenance with the support of the local council department of water.

The water system revamp and rehabilitation project in TA Mabuka has been a resounding success providing clean and reliable water to the community and empowering them to manage and maintain their own water supply.

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Update on Borehole Rehabilitation Programme Contributed by George Mkoko



Borehole Rehabilitation-Namalutcha Village



Introduction:

We are pleased to share an update on our ongoing borehole rehabilitation program. And last year, we have done rehabilitations in the areas of Machinjiri and Namalutcha, supported by MACS (Malawi Association for Christian Support).

Program Overview:

- 2 boreholes have been rehabilitated, providing clean water access to 1,500 beneficiaries

- Ongoing efforts aim to rehabilitate additional boreholes, expanding clean water access to more communities

- The program focuses on improving water quality, reducing water-borne diseases, and enhancing community health.

<u>Future Plans and Support Needed:</u>
Drill at least 2 new boreholes per year, targeting 5 more communities in the next 2 years
Train local women in borehole repair and maintenance, empowering them to take ownership of their water supply

- Establish a sustainable maintenance program, ensuring long-term functionality

By training local women in borehole repair, we are not only providing a vital skill but also addressing the gender inequality issues that often arise in water management. Your support will help us make a lasting impact on the lives of these communities.


