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Chairman's Report on Visit to Malawi-2024

Fikani and Kambali (Makwete) Under Fives Clinics

With the generous support of MMN (Medical Mission News) and Pennywell Farm, Under Fives Clinics have been built in the villages of Fikani and Kambali. The latest clinic built at Kambali was moved from the original proposed site at Makwete to Kambali as this was more central to enable more villages to be served. On visiting both sites, Mike and Sally were given a warm welcome by the villagers who offered gifts and a short play at Kambali. These clinics will not only be used for children's health but also for Family Planning and other health issues. Because the clinics have secure consulting rooms the Health Ministry is going to fit Solar Panels to the roofs and supply fridges to store vaccines for future vaccination programmes. One of the national papers has written an article on the Kambali Clinic and its many benefits to the surrounding villages. There is an obvious need for such clinics and during their visit they visited other potential sites at Milonder, Mishoni, Chimuraza, and Lundu.

Visit to Chinamvuu Primary School

The trustees visited this school to see for ourselves the completed girls changing rooms which Seedsowers sponsored in March. Prior to these being built, when the older girls had their menstruation, they had nowhere to change their pads. For a short period of time they used the Headmaster's house to change their pads but this became unworkable. Because of this many of them stayed away from school during this time and lost out on their education. Two lockable changing rooms have been constructed on this site. On visiting other such schools, we saw the need for such changing rooms to enable the girls to continue their education uninterrupted.

Visit to Sayere Primary School

This is the school where Seedsowers completely rehabilitated a classroom with a new concrete floor, redecorating and supplying a new blackboard with the generous support of CART. Other sponsors also helped in the supply of desks for this classroom. The Trustees were welcomed by the new headmistress, school committee and chiefs, and were presented with a cockerel and four dozen eggs. At this school Seedsowers also rebuilt the pupils' toilets. The needs at this school are great. There was a real lack of text books with the teacher having the only one for each class. Before the Trustees left, they presented the headmistress with a whole set of text books for all the classes, also a box of chalks. There are no desks for the pupils who have to sit on the floor for their lessons. There are several classrooms that have no windows and doors and therefore unsecured. The Trustees were asked if they could help in securing these buildings by supplying the necessary windows and doors.

New Borehole at Lundu

The Trustees visited the village and saw the installation funded by Seedsowers of an Afridev borehole which has been sunk to 45 metres. Again they were given a wonderful welcome by the villagers. At this village they also visited a village sponsored nursery class for the pre-school children. This was an enterprise started by the villagers themselves and was being held on a porch of a house. Again, the children were sitting on the floor as there were no seats for them.

Visit to Nankuyu Primary School

This school is where CART sponsored the building of a new classroom block to replace a condemned one built with money raised from the local community. The new classroom block was incomplete due to the Ministry of Education stepping in and insisting that it has to be a standard double classroom block and not a single block classroom which was planned to replace the condemned classroom. As work had already started it was decided by the Seedsowers team there to continue with the construction and as a consequence they have managed to build the walls up to roof level before running out of money. A further £3360 was required to fit the roof and complete the building works.

The Bishop has offered an office to Seedsowers in the Anglican compound which will be more conducive than where the present office is situated. They also met the Anglican Project Officer and were presented with Malawian Wraps.

Visit to the Christian Prison Fellowship-Zomba

Fletcher Kaiya, Mike and Sallys host, is the Chairman of the Christian Prison Fellowship at Zomba and Mike and Sally were invited to see the work that is going on there. The Fellowship is ecumenical with many denominations involved. What in the UK would be rated as category 'C' prisoners, in their last years of their sentence, have the option to learn a trade. They can train in Electrical, Fabrication and Tailoring skills. As ex-prisoners find it very hard to find jobs in the Malawi society, after their training and on their release they are given the necessary tools to start businesses of their own such as Welding Machines and Grinders for the fabricators and Sewing Machines etc. for the tailors. To help them also, they are given a small loan to purchase the necessary materials to start their enterprise. While they are training the families are also supported by the Fellowship. Their health and well-being are catered for together with the needs of the children such as their clothing and education. The Fellowship has Bible study classes also for the prisoners on site and is in itself a wonderful Christian witness. There is a beautiful chapel on site and accommodation for male and female prisoners. The re-offending rate of these prisoners is extremely low.

In this issue of the Seedsowers Newsletter we have again highlighted the building of the double classroom block at Nankuyu School. However, there is a great need now for 30 double desks as the pupils currently have to sit on large stones balancing their books on their knees.

A gift on one memorable occasion, of a Rooster was presented to me in honour of our visit to a school. A handsome beast whom I named Horatio. I might add I saved him from the pot, much to Mike's disappointment, and gave him to our hosts, Rev. Fletcher and Clara Kaiya to care for.

Days melted into weeks and soon after many visits and our presentation of 180 textbooks we finally found ourselves back in the airport cooler with a Malawian breeze behind us.

We met so many wonderful people and saw so many beautiful places, mountains, tea plantations to name but a few.

It was time to begin our journey home. The plane took off from Addis on our last leg. It was night Malawi was well and truly left in my soul.

I looked down at a jewelled spiders web spreading over Addis far below us, twinkling in the darkness like thousands of diamond like lamps lighting our way home from Malawi the true 'Warm Heart Of Africa'.
